




A Lenten Message from Our Rector

A Successful Lent?

How to do Lent? This is a question that I am often asked. One answer comes from the invitation to Lent issued during our Ash Wednesday Service. From the Prayerbook page 265, a Holy Lent is (practiced) by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God's Holy Word.

And, "to make a right beginning of repentance."



This seems a tall order, and the typical response is, "Can't I just give up chocolate?" It is amazing to me that after reading these instructions, our first response is to give something up. Certainly, it could also be an invitation to take something new on. Lent, however, it is not a one-way-fits-all season. The question stills persists how can I have a successful Lent?

Some time ago I saw an interview of a very young girl taking her vows to be a nun. She was asked what message does she want to share with the viewers. Her response was, "*Christ is not interested in our success, he is interested in our devotion.*" The world has taught us to strive for success in whatever we do, but in Christ's Kingdom there is a different desire for our lives. So, Lent might just be about being more devoted to our Lord. What might that look like in your life? More time in prayer, more time listening for God's voice, reading more scripture, going to more services, working on a project for God, setting a time to experience peace each day.

Whatever it may be for you, choose a new devotion, keep your chocolate, and join me in having a very Holy Lent.

Lent 2022

Please do take part at the noontime or 5 pm Ash Wednesday Eucharist and plan your Lent in a way that allows God to refresh and transform you. The Lenten Rule and Opportunities and Resources which follows are designed to help you.

Lastly, please plan to participate fully in Holy Week from **Palm Sunday** April 10 though Easter, April 17. The full schedule is elsewhere in this issue.


Lenten Opportunities and Resources

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, March 2nd with the Eucharist at 12 noon and 5 pm.

Saturday and Sunday worship continues at the usual times with scriptures, music, prayer and ceremonies attuned to the season of Lent.

Weekday Eucharist on Tuesday 5:30 pm and Wednesday noon continue as usual, as does Evening Prayer Monday through Friday at 5:00 pm. Plan to take part during Lent.

Lenten Rule

The disciplines of Lent are designed to train us to be different. Fasting frees us from being at the mercies of our physical appetites. Study frees us from accepting uncritically the assumptions of our culture. Prayer and worship form the ultimate declaration of independence by locating the true source of power and authority in God rather than in anything of this earth.

Praying God's grace to keep a Holy Lent, I resolve to undertake a discipline covering the following areas:

- Public Worship Sundays, Ash Wednesday, Holy Week.
- Penitence: Self-examination and confession
- Personal devotions: Prayer, meditation, reading, etc.
- Fasting: Giving up certain foods or activities
- Giving: Gifts of money, time and effort to other people or worthwhile causes

Please take time to prayerfully consider your Lenten Rule and write it down.

Christian Fasting

1. Two kinds of fasting
 - corporate, for all God's people
 - personal, according to one's own Rule
2. The Episcopal Church has days of fasting, discipline and self-denial. (See page 17 in *The Book of Common Prayer*)
3. Purpose of fasting
 - sorrow for sin
 - training and self-discipline
 - freeing resources
4. Guidelines for fasting and abstinence are modest.
5. For us "fasting" from television, internet, novels or committees might free up our most valuable resource - time - to spend with God and with the people we love.
6. How will you fast this Lent?

It's Not My Gift


Decades ago, whenever I was asked to volunteer in an area that I perceive to be difficult, I simply said, "It's not my gift." It was the easy way out. Was the task really too difficult or was I just being selfish and lazy? As I grew in my Christian walk, God showed me how gifted I was in many areas if only I would say, "Yes."

There are some people in this world who seem to have outstanding gifts. One person I recall is Ed Sullivan. His gift of discernment set him on stage in front of millions of people when television was just beginning to break into the average household. This diminutive man who was not an eloquent speaker became the Master of Ceremonies every single Sunday night to millions of people.

Ed had a unique gift of seeing talent in others. He lured them into this new phenomenon where an entertainer would be looking into a box in the middle of an empty stage. That person or group would have to give of themselves not knowing that millions of people were watching their every move.

Ed's gift of discernment saw talent, invited talent, nurtured talent and drew millions of households into one spot for one hour on one day of the week. He brought into every household the talking hand (let me know if you remember this one), Brenda Lee, Jose Jimenez, the Beatles and talent far beyond the scope of most peoples' imagination. In my humble opinion, Ed Sullivan was, and will always be, the king of television variety shows.

Yet, the most profound talent I recall from the Ed Sullivan Show to this day has become a gift to me. It's as if God translated this pithy exercise into a life lesson. Plate spinning. Please let me know if you remember this one. A gentleman stands in front of the TV camera with some plates and long, flexible sticks about one yard long. One plate is placed on top of the stick and spun into motion. As that plate on a stick is moving he sets another in motion, and another and still another until up to twelve plates are in motion. Yes, a plate may drop off but somehow he is able to stoop down, while spinning all the other plates, pick it up and begin this odd plate spinning again. In all my careers over the past several decades, I equate that talent with my own actions. I often ask myself, "Am I spinning too many plates at one time?"



When it comes to serving the Lord with gladness, I have met several gifted plate spinners. They are the ones who keep a ministry going when everyone else has said, "It's not my gift." They are the ones who help a worship service run smoothly as they greet then usher then read from the lectionary. They might preach, too, if it were permitted. They may have also done all the background work with church bulletins and setting the altar for communion. They are plate spinners par excellence.

And then there are the hand-sitters. They are also gifted. They have great discernment when it comes to pitching in. *"It's not my gift. . . . I'm already spinning one plate and that is plenty in my life right now . . . I'm retired from plate spinning."* Many hand sitters do not realize their many gifts because they choose not to exercise this simple word, "Yes." In their defense, perhaps no one has invited the hand sitter by simply asking for help. It's not the hand sitter's fault if they cannot see the need. Plate spinners are notorious for saying, "yes" far too many times. Plate spinners need to offer one of their spinning plates to a hand sitter.

OR, let's all "step up to the plate" (terrible pun) and help one another to serve the Lord with gladness. Let's all say, "yes" to the invitation to take the SPIRITUAL GIFTS ASSESSMENT. It's a simple questionnaire that takes about 15 minutes to complete.

However, before you take this Spiritual Gifts Assessment, you are invited to join the rest of the church on ZOOM for TWO 1-hour SESSIONS. Hand sitters and Plate Spinners are invited to come together to learn a little about talents that God turns into Spiritual Gifts. Plate Spinners will learn to share by offering a plate or two to the hand sitter who may never have heard the call of God to 'pitch in' and help.

Come together. Pitch in. Let's all "step up to the plate," to not only discover or affirm our spiritual gifts but also to use them to grow St. Mary's Church into a place where crowds are drawn to God in Christ Jesus, much like Ed Sullivan drew millions to television.

From Our Junior Warden

The Junior Warden of St. Mary's Church is responsible for the maintenance and care of its four and a half acres of property, including three buildings, large areas of pavement and general operation of the facilities. As of February 1, I assumed the responsibility of this position.

Just as a home has immediate and long-term maintenance projects, St. Mary's has several jobs to accomplish and just as with our homes, there are always small repairs and minor fixes. To keep you abreast of what our plans are this year, I am listing them in order of their priority.

This year:

- Review all contracts and contracted services to assure we are getting the best for our money, and that we are not going to get unpleasant surprises.
- Complete phases 2 and 3 of the water drainage project. This project is designed to stop water from seeping under our buildings and flooding the parking lot.

Phase 1 was completed last summer with cleaning out the original drainage system behind the property and reestablishing an escape route for large volumes of water. Phase 2 includes installation of an underground channel to drain rain water from the downspouts and direct it to the drainage system behind the property. In Phase 3, we will add gutters and downspouts (to roofs that currently do not have them) to prevent water from undermining the foundations of the church and parish hall. This is a major undertaking.

- Install fiberoptic cable to the church for faster internet service and provide an opportunity to install a less expensive telephone service.

Long term:

- Work on improving the lighting and acoustics in the church.

Anne Hartley Ordination

Greetings, St. Mary's family!

As most of you know, I was ordained a transitional deacon at the Cathedral Church of St. Peter on January 22nd and your prayers and blessings lifted me up that day. I am grateful for everything you've done to support me during discernment.



The service itself was very moving. Two other women were ordained at this service. Amy Feins from Trinity-by-the-Cove studied at Nashotah House. Sandy Rogers from Calvary Church in Seminole is headed for an Anglican year at Sewanee. We processed in to Hyfrydol's hymn, *Love divine, all loves excelling*. The invocations stood out in my memory, when we chanted *Veni Sancte Spiritus* and when Bishop

Howe prayed for the Holy Spirit to fill us with grace and power. Our call to serve came in the next prayer. Bishop Garrison reinforced that message, giving us each a white hand towel (which he bought at Bed, Bath and Beyond that morning!) to remind us that we are called to serve. During the reception, Bob Foltz pulled me



aside to remind me to serve the least of these throughout my ministry. I will not forget this promise.

Many priests came to witness the ordination, including the rector of my new parish. Heartfelt thanks to Fr. Ryan Wright and Bob Foltz who presented me for ordination. Fr. Wright and I attended the same seminary and his support began even before he arrived at St. Mary's. Bob was present from the beginning as a member of my discernment committee with Joanne Pace, Jack Sites, and Barbara Bateman. Each member was instrumental in affirming my call to the priesthood. You all gave Maddie and me a spiritual home, for which we are so grateful.

The day after my ordination, I served at the altar as deacon at my new parish, St. Thomas' Episcopal Church in St. Petersburg. As curate, I care for the souls of this parish through pastoral care and family (youth) ministry. I'm also serving at the altar every Sunday. My ordination to the priesthood will probably take place later in the summer at St. Thomas.

A hope of mine is to have a series of musical offerings for



the greater Bonita Springs community. In January we hosted the community choral society in a performance of the Rachmaninoff vespers which was very good. We now have a chamber organ and harpsichord which should be utilized for music programs. My best and dearest friend, Dominique Serve is one of the finest organists/harpsichordists in France. You can listen to some of his performances on YouTube. He has been the head of the early music program at the music conservatory in Aix-en-Provence and has connections to some world class musicians, both instrumentalists and singers.

Since the last issue of Tidings, Penny Wise completed the 2021 retail year with record sales. We were delighted to give St. Mary's two checks: a \$55 thousand check for outreach and another \$55 thousand check for other church uses. Sales of fine jewelry added significantly to our sales totals, so much that we have added a second display case for fine jewelry. Our generous donors have our profound gratitude.

On Monday, February 21 Penny Wise had its annual general meeting followed by the staff appreciation luncheon. Volunteers were recognized for their lengths of service and other specific deeds on behalf of the store. At 32 years, Betty Zimbrow had the most service. Among other volunteers many had 20 or more years of service, 15 to 19, 10 to 14, and 5 to 9 years. Then there were the new kids on the block with fewer than 5 years. New volunteers are always needed and welcomed.



The major accomplishments of Penny Wise during the year were reviewed during the meeting, many of which have been noted in previous issues of Tidings. Unmentioned to date is the winter clothing program at Penny Wise which this year sent 40 cartons of winter clothing to the Dearborn County Clearing House for Emergency Aid via the Beecher Presbyterian Church in Ohio. This organization makes business appropriate



attire available without charge to persons entering or reentering the labor force who need these clothes.

Plans for improving the store

during 2022 were also reviewed at the meeting. These include exterior lighting improvements, security cameras for the entrances and new display furniture for the better purses we are receiving and want to feature.

Store hours during season are Tuesday through Saturday from 10 am until 3 pm. Donations are gratefully accepted at the red rear doors during business hours, but can be dropped off at any time.
